

Armenian-Turkish Studies Workshop Sheffield Hallam University June 9th 2014

The primary aim of this workshop is to bring together scholars, researchers and activists from a range of disciplines in order to reflect upon the approaching centenary of the Armenian genocide and its wider implications for Armenian and Turkish histories, culture, politics and society. The workshop will not only address the complex and contested history of the fate of the Ottoman Armenians but will also consider its long-term aftermaths and the ways in which they relate to the key questions and priorities for scholars of contemporary Armenia, Turkey and their neighbours and their shared past, present and future.

The workshop is intended as the first stage in the development of an interdisciplinary research network and accompanying seminar series. This network is intended to foster dialogue between postgraduate, early career and senior scholars working in Armenian-Turkish studies and related areas, and facilitate the development of stronger connections between scholars working in the field, in the UK, and overseas, as well as providing an opportunity to encourage collaborative and comparative work with scholars working in other disciplines or on comparative cases. Following the preliminary workshop in Sheffield in June 2014, the conveners will apply for funding to enable the continuation of the network, with the long-term goal of setting up a UK Armenian-Turkish Studies Association.

In addition to the development of this network this workshop will also provide a forum in which to begin planning for ways in which academics, NGOs and diaspora organisations can collaborate to develop events to mark the centenary of the Armenian genocide in Britain.
