Chilingerian to Discuss the Armenian Church in Karabagh in Pasadena, July 22

PASADENA - Scholar and analyst of contemporary Armenian affairs, Hratch Tchilingerian, will lecture on the Armenian Church in Karabagh, Wednesday, July 22, 1998 at St. Gregory Armenian Church.

Since 1988, the earthquakes in Armenia, the struggle for independence, the war in Karabagh have all shaped the public and private lives of Armenians However, parallel to the political, economic and social factors of these events, a religious perspective was added to public discourse particularly in Karabagh. This presentation will focus on the role of the Armenian Church and clergy in Karabagh and the language of religious discourse in the context of the war with Azerbaijan.

Tchilingerian is a Ph.D candidate, Sociology Department, London School of Eco-

nomics and Political Science. Since 1994 he has been studying the developments in Armenia and Karabagh and has traveled there extensively. In 1996, Tchilingerian spent the summer in Karabagh where he conducted qualitative research for his dissertation. His analytical articles have appeared in European, North American and Middle Eastern journals and publications.

AGBU Delegation Meets with NKR President Ghukasian

STEPANAKERT - Nagorno-Karabagh President Arkady Ghukasian received on July 11 the Armenian General Benevolent Union (AGBU) delegation, led by AGBU Armenia office head Ashot Ghazarian. Ani Lachinian. AGBU Melkonian Educational Institute (Cyprus) Principal, Lana Kazanjian, AGBU Central Board Special Project Coordinator in Armenia, Davit Zenian, Armenian Information Service head in Washington DC and Anahit Ghazarian, American University of Armenia, Extension Program Executive Director were among the delegation.
